Why?

A Blue Action Dialogue is useful for countries looking to **strengthen their ability to address organized crime in their fisheries sector.**

A Blue Action Dialogue supports **national agencies** to:

develop a **shared understanding** of crime in their fisheries sector;

decide on **strategic action** to better address crime in their fisheries sector; and

test prioritized action to address such crime and learn about results and effects.

To do so –

strengthen **dialogue and cooperation.**



How?

A Blue Action Dialogue is:

Country-led:

It is co-designed with countries to build on existing processes and offers a suite of curated tools to choose from

Knowledge-based:

It draws on empirical research, systems and design thinking, and local knowledge and know-how

Tandem-facilitated:

It is guided by a vetted international and a country-based facilitator

Peer-supported:

It fosters peer support across agencies and across countries
